Council Meeting Highlights

- Council officially named Josh Saskiw as the new Chief Administrative Officer for the Village of Marwayne.
- Council had the pleasure of receiving Cpl. Brian Weisbrod's report on the RCMP activity in the Vermilion River Region, in addition to an update on public safety initiatives.
- Due to concerns in the community, council approved the positioning of a speed indicator on Railway Ave to promote traffic safety and awareness.
- Council was updated on the progress of the basketball court renovations, with ASL starting the paving process the first week of July.
- Under council's planning for growth and change initiative, information and ideas were discussed for a future facelift for the Marwayne Friendship Centre.

2025 Municipal Election

Position Responsibilities

- Support in the maintenance on roads, property, vehicles and equipment.

- Back up support at the water plant, including on call rotation with other employees.
- Support for all water and sewer functions performed (water and sewer distribution systems, water treatment plan, lift stations etc.)

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SUPPORTING SUMMER GRIEF

Grieving in summer can be especially disorienting because the sunshine, social events, and expectations of joy often clashes with the grieving experience. Here are some ideas to consider when thinking about supporting through experiences of grief this summer.

1. Acknowledge The Season is Hard

You do not have to feel okay just because the sun is shining. Grief does not follow a set timeline. Be where you are emotionally, by acknowledging that this is a difficult journey.

2. Set Boundaries with Time and Plans

Summer can be full of gatherings and invitations to weddings, birthday parties, or other celebrations. You are allowed to say no and set boundaries on your attendance. Many people often find it helpful to say "maybe" and then you always have the option of changing your mind.

3. Turn to Nature

While summer can feel overstimulating, it also offers gentle ways to soothe grief if you can turn towards nature. This may include going for morning walks before it gets hot, sitting quietly near water, gardening or tending to a plant, or catching the sunrise or sunset.

4. Create Your Own Rituals

Grief responds well to small rituals. Some ideas that can be helpful for summer could be writing your loved one a letter and leaving it somewhere that reminds you of them, making a playlist that connects memories of your loved one, or choosing a flower to plant at home that represents your loved one.

5. Connect With Support System

Grief can feel isolating, especially when it feels that others in your life are "moving on." Reach out to someone who can support you where you are at or consider joining a grief support group either in-person or online.

6. Give Yourself Grace

You do not have to be productive in order to get the most out of summer. If you find that you are just surviving most day, remind yourself that this is enough.

No matter what strategies you lean into this summer, know that you are doing your best to manage a very difficult season of your life.

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A Pastor's Gleanings

It's 4 AM, the forecast on my phone says there is an 80% chance of rain at 10 AM. I don't know what the percentage is, that the forecast is right, but I find myself checking it on my phone many times over the course of the day. Forecasts are good but never certain.

As daylight slowly displaces the darkness, I read "For you have delivered my soul from death, yes, my feet from falling, that I may walk before God in the light of life." (Psalm 56:13) This is 100% reliable. Absolutely certain.

How can I know that? "Let us know; let us press on to know the Lord;" urged the ancient prophet. (Hosea 6:3a KJV)

6:45 AM phone says 98% chance at 10AM, 45% at 7AM. Put baby calf in barn at 7:15, no rain yet.

"As sure as dawn breaks, so sure is his daily arrival. He comes as rain comes, as spring rain refreshing the ground." (Hosea 6:3b The Message)

Forecast changed at 9AM to 47% chance at 10, weather is difficult to predict. Paths of the storms change.

Not so with God's Word. "Come let us return to the Lord." The prophet exhorts, "... he will revive us ... that we may live before him." (Hosea 3:1a&2b) God's word is a "lamp to my feet and a light to my path." Sure, as the dawn, he speaks to us in his word. That is how I know.

Check it out. There are many Bible apps you can get on your phone. Then join with us or others in Church to worship. You can be refreshed. Whether it rains or not.

Where did you grow up?

On a farm in the Marwayne area towards the Alcurve area.

When and how did you find yourself living in Marwayne?

I married my high school sweetheart after finishing college in Edmonton. Bryon was an insurance broker with his Dad. They had the insurance brokerage G.T. Horton Agencies.

What year did you become CAO for the village of Marwayne? When did you retire?

In 2000 I became the CAO. I had balanced working at the office and teaching piano lessons starting in 1982. I would teach before school then make the long walk to the office (about one block ②), then afternoons teaching during school hours with an arrangement made with the principal, the kids would walk to my house for lessons. It was a hard decision to give up teaching entirely to step into the full-time role of CAO. I retired December 31, 2017 with a total of 35 years working for the Village.

What made you decide to work for the village?

Back in 1982 when I first began working for the Village it was a contract position. In what is now the Public Works office, the Village and Horton Agencies ran out of the same office. It was the days of handwritten and manual calculations of each water bill and tax notice. I thought I was so "with it" putting my new computer programming skills to good use by programming our new Vic20 (anyone remember those first computers?) to do the calculations for me. When the Village got its first computerized program in the '90's I was so thankful. After Bryon's Mom's death in 1983 I stepped in to help more and more each year.

Of all the projects you worked on, which was the most rewarding and why?

Hands down the Center Street Revitalization project. I love the downtown. When I look at it I see the cumulation of community desires and the renewing of infrastructure for future generations. I love watching the trees mature that I selected and helped plant

What were some of the improvements you seen over your time working at the village?

Marwayne has seen many big projects over the last 20 years, most stemming from one document "The Marwayne Sustainability Plan" which I wrote not a consultant. It brought the visionaries of our community together to set the goals and desires. Then the detail people, the planners, the do'ers of our community kicked in accomplishing a lot for such a small place. Remember in 2016 we were federally recognized for our innovation and dedication? A new hall, renovated arena and campground, original streets and underground renewed with the help of grant money that we would never have qualified for if the people of Marwayne had not taken the time to engage and dream together.

I remember when Council took a huge step and decided to build that first cul-de-sac on 4th Street and not just wish there was more lots available for our young people who were coming back since there were jobs from the booming oil industry. I laugh thinking of Rob Centazzo during those years excited about the laying of the new pipes. Me amazed at the huge piles of sand! And yet when the power poles were being put in ATCO was hitting water from the high water table. The first trees we planted (Rob and I) are those big poplars and pines at the ball diamonds following that project.

What were some of the challenges you faced over that period of time?

was getting the day-to-day operations information out of the heads of our public works and the consultants (like Rusway). I always hated hearing from an engineer "if you had told me that sooner then". By the time I left we had captured all the stacks of "rolls of plans", the scribblers, the scraps of paper and personal knowledge. Now Public Works and the next engineer can make well- informed decisions.

What do you see in the future for the community of Marwayne?

I see our community at a crossroads. We were all lulled into isolation during Covid and the cultural changes of depending on social media for social interaction. I challenge each of us to move across those walls of isolation again reaching out to our neighbors. As my husband has faced huge health challenges in the last two years, community support has been so encouraging for us. The acts of kindness, the prayers, the encouraging words - thank you Marwayne!!

What advice would you have for new or young residents in the community?

I say be like the new trees that are being continually planted around Marwayne, put your roots deep into this community, make lifetime connections, there's a high water table here in some areas and once your roots are in that stream you will flourish- your leaves will not wither.
